Is your website anybody's job?

Most businesses have the tools. Few have the system. This diagnostic is a structured self-assessment across 20 questions — covering goals, analytics integrity, tracking infrastructure, conversion performance, and optimization process.

Never means it doesn't happen or you genuinely don't know. *Sometimes* means inconsistently or partially. *Always* means it's a systematic, documented practice. The diagnostic is useful only if you use honest answers.

How to Read Your Results

MOSTLY "NEVER"

Your website is unmanaged. This is the most common result, and it's fixable. The first priority is establishing the foundation: reliable measurement, verified conversion tracking, and documented goals. Everything else builds from there.

MOSTLY "SOMETIMES"

You have the instincts but not the system. Things happen reactively rather than intentionally. The work here is moving from ad hoc to structured — creating the cadence, the ownership, and the documentation that turns occasional good behavior into a repeatable process.

MOSTLY "ALWAYS"

You have a functioning performance management system. The question is whether it's measuring the right things and whether the optimization cadence is tight enough to compound results over time. Pressure-test your data quality and the rigor of your hypothesis-to-implementation cycle.

MIXED RESULTS

This is the most instructive pattern. The sections where you answered "Never" or "Sometimes" are your constraint. A managed optimization process built on unreliable data produces unreliable conclusions. The diagnostic tells you exactly where the chain breaks.

Where Independent Knowledge Fits

If your "Never" answers cluster in Sections 1–2 cluster:

The starting point is measurement infrastructure: GA4 configuration, event taxonomy, conversion tracking, and an analytics foundation you can trust.

If your "Never" answers cluster in Sections 3–4 cluster:

The work is tracking infrastructure and conversion architecture — server-side tagging, tag governance, and a systematic approach to improving what the site actually produces.

If your "Never" answers cluster in Section 5 breaks down:

The engagement is ongoing optimization: a testing roadmap, a review cadence, and the compounding improvement that turns a functioning site into a revenue asset.
